Message to Our Community

The Saskatoon Preschool Foundation continues to uphold our mission of advocating for and supporting access to preschool programs by granting tuition subsidies for children of families with financial barriers. We help carry their burden by providing a tuition subsidy directly to the preschool the child has an opportunity to attend.

Government funded pre-kindergarten programs exist in community schools but not all communities and/or areas of the city have designated community schools. However, all socio-economic groups live in all areas and communities.

Families applying to the SPF are living below the poverty line with incomes less than \$2400/month. Many of these families have language barriers as well as other obstacles such as unemployment, disability, single parented, etc. Some families are large and some are smaller, but all of them have at least one preschool aged child that would benefit from programming offered in a preschool.

We advocate for access to quality preschool programs because they provide an ideal foundation for early literacy skills, support language and social skill development and foster a readiness for school attitude. Attendance in early education classrooms contribute to a child's social, physical and intellectual development. Moreover, families have an opportunity to build community in their neighbourhood and with the school.

In 2019, the SPF subsided over \$90,000 in tuition to over 40 different preschools for over 120 children. SPF believes there are many more children that are not attending any kind of pre-kindergarten or preschool.

The average preschool tuition for a 3-morning or afternoon program is \$1000.00 per year. We provide subsidies up to \$800 per child per year. The SPF does not want tuition costs to be a barrier for any child to attend preschool.

We strive to meet this need through operating on a very lean budget with low administration costs, organizing fundraising initiatives and events, applying for grants, cultivating new and existing donors. The interest from our investments is a key component to our funds but if necessary, SPF has accessed funds from the principle from our investment portfolio which is managed by Connor, Clark & Lunn.

Our office is open two days a week with a part time office administrator. SPF is grateful for our space on the 3rd floor of King George School allocated to us by the Saskatoon Public School Division.

SPF continues to be known as working board. All of the board members are active volunteers determined to work diligently to raise the funds required to grant every deserving tuition subsidy application that is submitted.

Heartfelt gratitude to our dedicated Board members and office administrator who work to see that the mission, vision and purpose of the Saskatoon Preschool Foundation carries on.

A huge THANK YOU to all our corporate, special interest and individual donors. We can continue to do this service for our community because of your generosity and support.

In truth, the SPF would love to not exist, but until government funded pre-kindergarten programs are available for every preschooler in every school, SPF will continue to need generous donor support from the community to ensure that children are able to attend quality preschool programs in every community and neighbourhood in Saskatoon.

Advocacy

The Saskatoon Preschool Foundation has three areas of focus regarding advocacy for early childhood education:

- Continuing to build awareness regarding the importance of early childhood education;
- Ensuring that cost is not a barrier for vulnerable preschool children to have access to an early learning program; and,
- Raising awareness regarding the work of the SPF in Saskatoon and surrounding area.

These areas come to life through the contributions of all of the board members in activities such as:

- Distribution of informational post cards, posters, etc. throughout the city, business cards for board members
- Communication with the Open Door Society, Saskatoon Public School Foundation, Saskatoon Preschool Teachers Group
- Representation at the PIRS Preschool Teachers Conference
- Publication of an article regarding the importance of preschool programming in the Planet S magazine for Giving Tuesday
- Attendance at the Nutrien Meet and Greet
- Applications for grants
- Updating by-laws
- Emailing the preschools updates and invitations
- Fundraising/awareness events (e.g., Burger Night, Trivia Night, Raffle)
- Recruiting new board members

**Research is clear in supporting early childhood learning prior to kindergarten:

- Approximately 6 months advantage in terms of skill development upon entering kindergarten;
- Increased rates of high school graduation; and,
- Decreased involvement in delinquency and/or adult crime.

Currently the average preschool tuition is approximately \$1,000/year. The cost of youth incarceration and adult medium incarceration is approximately \$75,000/year. Think of what we could do for preschool children with \$74,000 if we kept just one person out of prison for a year!

We appeal to everyone to tell at least 3 people over the coming year about the value of early learning and about our website where donations can be made. We are grateful to all organizations and individuals who have supported us in the past and continue to do so!
